## Capital Campaign and 2023-2024 Annual Giving Update

#### 2022 Bridge Capital Giving Update

As of December 13, 2022, Salem has received approximately \$330,000 for the one-year Capital Bridge Appeal. There were total pledges of \$312,000 so receipts have exceeded pledges by over \$25,000.

Pledges for the second three-year capital appeal beginning in 2023 and going through 2025 total \$465,000. Several of those pledges were scheduled to be paid before the end of 2022. We are well on our way to our goal of \$600,000. You are encouraged to attend the annual meeting on Sunday, January 29 at 9:30am to receive an up-to-date report on capital appeal giving and what the balance is on the mortgage.

#### Annual Giving for 2023-2024

While the commitments to the second capital campaign are on target to meet the goal of \$600,000, general giving commitments for the coming year are lower than expected, and we are facing a much larger deficit than in previous years.

With this information, please complete and return your annual giving commitment cards if you have not done so already. If you have already returned your cards, please consider increasing your annual commitment. An increase of even 5% would help to close the deficit and help sustain Salem's operating budget for 2023.

A budget meeting for questions preceding the annual meeting is scheduled for Sunday, January 22, following the first service at 9:30am.

ABOUT CUDDLES WITH KINDNESS® Cuddles with Kindness® is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to providing comfort to kids in need. Our mission is to provide comfort to children facing traumatic situations while amplifying our goal to inspire kindness and compassion, no matter your age. We do this by providing cuddly stuffed animals for them to hold on to. Founder, Taylor Larson spent 9 days in the OSF Children's Hospital of Illinois when she was a child. During her stay she received a bear on Valentine's Day. It changed her forever. Today, Taylor and the Cuddles with Kindness<sup>®</sup> organization delivers thousands of stuffed friends to children each year. Help us in our mission of "kindness."

In 2005, Salem's Parish Nurse, Lori Reimer and her family suffered what one might describe as an "unbearable" loss when Allison Reimer, Lori's daughter, died suddenly at the age of 20 of a brain aneurysm. Allison grew up at Salem and many remember her love of life, family, friends, Girl Scouts, Camp Tapawingo, and Greenville College. She loved Jesus and she loved her Salem family. She also loved teddy bears and had quite a collection of her own while growing up.

Lori, who has been faithful in keeping Allison's memory alive in a variety of ways over the years, started collecting teddy bears in January 2015. She collected 50 or so the first year and donated them to a local radio show who was hosting a Teddy Bear Drive for the Children's Hospital. The second year, family and friends joined in, and the effort snowballed from there. Lori's largest collection was in 2020 when almost 500 teddy bears were collected in Allison's memory. The radio station has stopped hosting its annual Teddy Bear Drive. Lori now donates the bears she collects directly to a local organization called "Cuddles with Kindness<sup>®</sup>."

#### Holy Hygge by Jamie Erickson (248.4 ERI)

*Hygge* [HYOO-guh] has become a cultural buzzword. When many read about this Danish practice, their shoulders lift in excitement, then fall in exhale. In a culture of rush, hygge appeals to their desire for rest—for slow living, shared moments, and fostered friendships. Hygge has strong ties to beauty, contentment, and well-being. It's warm and inviting. Hygge is the opposite of hustle. It eschews abundance. It savors. It takes things slow and envelopes you in sanctuary. Hygge is home. When you sit in a comfy chair by the fire, that's hygge. When you arrange a fresh bouquet of wildflowers on a bedside table, that's hygge too. Candles, soft furnishings, natural light, fresh-baked pastries, intimate gatherings with

friends—these are what come to mind when you think of hygge. But hygge can be so much more. In Holy Hygge, author Jamie Erickson unites the popular Danish practice with the deep, theological truths of the gospel. She unpacks the seven tenets of *hygge*: hospitality, relationships, well-being, atmosphere, comfort, contentment, and rest. In addition, Erickson shows how the external veneer of a lifestyle can create a lifegiving home only when placed under the hope of the gospel. Holy Hygge provides practical ideas for using *hygge* to gather people and introduce them to faith in Christ.



#### **The Characters of Creation** by Daniel Darling (231.7 DAR)

Most Christians are familiar with the opening words of Genesis: "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth." But push beyond those iconic words, and sometimes the details get a little hazy. And strange. God walked around in a garden? Eve was made from Adam's rib? A talking serpent? And what in the world were the "Nephilim"? In The Characters of Creation, Daniel Darling re-introduces readers to the story they thought they knew. He explains the Bible's story of how we got here and how things got messed up, and gives fresh insights into the first people in God's unfolding plan of redemption-from Adam

and Eve, The Serpent, Cain and Abel, and Noah.

## Salem Book Club: "Miracles and Other **Reasonable Things," by Sarah Bessey**

### Zoom Discussion, January 25 at 8pm-9pm

A deeply moving and life-affirming account of wrestling with faith and God and finding miracles in the most unexpected places.

In the brief instant Sarah Bessey realized that her minivan was, inevitably, going to hit the car on the highway on the bright, clear day of the crash, she knew intuitively that it would have life-changing consequences. But as she navigated the winding SARAH BESSEY path from her life before the accident—as a popular author, preacher, and loving wife and mother—to her new life after, inhabiting a body that no longer felt like her own, she found that the most unexpected result wasn't the way this shook her body, but how it shook her deeply rooted faith, upending everything she thought she knew and held so dearly.

Weaving together theology and memoir in her trademark narrative style, Sarah tells us the story of the moment that changed her body and how it ultimately changed her life. The road of healing leads to Rome where she met the Pope (it's complicated) and encountered the Holy Spirit in the last place she expected. She writes about her miraculous healing, learning to live with chronic pain, and the ways God makes us whole in the midst of suffering. She invites us to a path of knowing God that is filled with ordinary miracles, hope in the face of overwhelming evidence to the contrary, and other completely reasonable things.

Insightful, profound, and unexpected, Miracles and Other Reasonable Things is a wild, spirit-filled story of what it means to live with both grief and faith, suffering and joy, as we wrestle with God.




### How Lutherans Interpret the Bible
