Every season has a purpose and is an opportunity to see God as the God of new beginnings. The familiar passage from Ecclesiastes reminds us that:


"For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven..." -Ecclesiastes 3:1



### **Cross-generational Service Project Assembly**

On **Rally Day, September 10,** join the cross-generational team to assemble the items collected into "kits" to assist Phoenix CDS in their work. Their primary goal is to end homelessness and provide the individuals, families and veterans they serve with a warm, safe place to live independently –

and away from the dangers of the streets. Phoenix CDS works with them to set and achieve goals, make healthy life choices, find employment, build skills, and become stable, self-sufficient members of society. Check out their website for more information: **www.phoenixcds.org**.

Sunday School classes (ages 3-year-olds though High School) will participate in the service project and then parents and students will have time to go to the classrooms and meet teachers. There will be a shortened class time on **Sunday, September 10**.



Salih Arbeyi's CRU team wrapped up their summer mission in Arusha, Tanzania in June. This was an amazing three-week trip for their team. Every time when faced with a roadblock they have seen God's provision.

Their team consisted of six university students with two as agriculture specialists. They worked mainly with the Maasai community in northern Tanzania, and conducted three agriculture workshops, each lasting four days.

Maasai are a people group who are predominantly live a nomadic pastoralist lifestyle. Due to droughts and losing their pastures in recent years, the community had an urgent need for food security. As they surveyed the access to meals, the team discovered some families who only had access to a meal every other day.

#### **Surprises & Challenges**

The trip was full of surprises and challenges for the team. Maybe a bit more than usual – here are some highlights.

#### **Surprises**

The resilience of the team of students was admirable. The last three weeks had no shortage of inconvenience. Long flights, no running water, days without power or cell service, rough roads, life in the bush, and 13-hour days pushed the limits of their capacity. But the joy and commitment of the students until the very last day exceeded expectations.

Teaching a group of pastoralist communities who never farmed was a scary task. The team was not sure

if they would be open to the idea since historically they presumed this a labor for the slaves implemented by the colonial suppressors. Despite their fears, the Maasai were very engaged and invested in learning how to grow their own food. Recent years have threatened their very existence with lack of food for their families or livestock. As soon as the workshops started, the team knew their work could make a survival impact for these families.

#### Challenges

The magnitude of the need in this part of the world can easily overwhelm one's mind. One of the first challenges for the team was the lack of time they had with the people. Even though workshops were extended to four days compared to three, the team could only cover the essential foundations for composting, raised garden beds, nutrition, and the core farming practices.

The first two workshops were in a tropical climate and comparably some on the best soils we worked on. The last workshop in the Maasai land was a landscape a few years before complete desertification. They had to

come together as a team and find farming techniques that have a chance in this dry and sandy landscape. The team decided Zai Pits (pictured below), a small basin in which seeds of annual or perennial crops are planted, had a better chance for success than raised garden beds.

The nutrition-deprived sand was another issue for their gardens. The clay-rich termite mounts and dry manure (which they had in abundance) was used to create a soil mixture that had a higher moisture hold capacity. Over time their garden beds will start to create top soil and additional compost would make farming possible in this harsh environment.

Pastor Bariki is a visionary man. When he heard about our ministry, he wanted us to teach farming to his Maasai church. He saw the first two workshops in the lush green areas, but he didn't know how we would react when we visited his church. As we came up with the new techniques for farming, he told the team, "We expected you to see the land and run away. I wanted it to be real, but I didn't think we could farm in this dry land."

Overall, this trip to Tanzania was full of spiritual and physical impacts for the local communities. They never doubted the instant impact they created as they serve.

Recently, Salih connected with Pastor Bariki from Arusha, Tanzania. The CRU seeds have sprouted and through their summer mission over 430 young adults accepted Christ as their Savior. Praise to Lord for both physical and spiritual harvest! Salih is walking away with

After two long trips, Salih is back home in Dallas. After taking a few days for rest and adjustment, he will start working on a long list of summer goals.

The CRU team is growing with two new staff and a new intern. The team is also expanding the content of their workshops with at least five new lessons. This summer will be a time of preparation for the expansion of their agriculture program.



The next phase of the Sunday School curriculum has been written! Praise God! All curriculum has been sent to the translators. Most of the lessons have been received back and translated into Chichewa. The next step is making sure all the formatting is correct and it is ready for the printers. It will go through one final check before the teachers are trained and given the books, but it is so exciting to see things at this stage.

The Ulriches have already been using the curriculum at one local church to test it. It has been exciting to

see God growing the children every time that Jaime and Luke, go and teach. They are very excited to get the lessons out to more children as soon as we can.

Jamie has continued in her opportunity to help with writing a curriculum for four different countries in Africa. It has been a neat opportunity to work with so many different individuals from different countries. Continue to pray for this wonderful opportunity as it could continue to give so many teachers the needed resources to help them to minister to children in these countries.

#### **Finances**

Jamie and Luke depend on prayer partners, but also financial

partnerships from individuals and churches for their monthly income. Over these last eight years they have been blessed by their prayer and financial partners. Each month they see how faithful God is in providing for our needs through all of you. Just last month they received some money from a first-time financial partner.

With prices of almost everything starting to climb, drastically, their current balance is drawing closer to dipping into the negative.

A friend told the Ulriches that when this happens, they should take these steps, in this order:

- 1. Ask God why... in case he wants to show us something.
- 2. Ask God first... we go to God; we trust in his sustenance.
- 3. Only then do we connect with our partners... make the need known, God is bigger. But we do want people to have the chance to be part of His ministry, so we make it known.

The Ulriches have done steps one and two and He has made it clear to stay in Malawi to continue His work. So Luke is making it known that they are in need of additional financial partners... and they are continuing to pray. Would you please pray and see if God would like you to partner with the ministry He is doing in Malawi?

#### FROM THE PARISH NURSE, LORI REIMER

Cardiac arrest and heart attack are not the same, but people often use the terms interchangeably. Cardiac arrest (an electrical issue) occurs when the heart malfunctions and stops beating unexpectedly. A person quickly becomes unresponsive and will stop breathing. Death occurs within minutes if the victim does not receive treatment.

A heart attack (a circulation problem) is caused by blocked blood flow to the heart which will cause some of the heart muscle to die.

Cardiac arrest can be reversible in some victims if it's treated within a few minutes.

Call your local emergency number and start CPR right away. If an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is available, use it as soon as possible. Salem has 2 AEDs - one on the main floor by the front door and one on the second floor in the lounge area.

With a heart attack, every second matters. Even if you're not sure it's a heart attack, call your local emergency number. Emergency personnel can start treatment sooner than if taken to the hospital by car.

For more information on these two conditions, check out the American Heart Association or information in the Parish Nurse office.

CPR/AED/First Aid training will be held at Salem on **August 24 from noon to 3:30pm**. This certification class will be taught by personnel from Carle Health and the cost is \$55 per person (cash, check, or Venmo to the Carle health personnel).
