Monthly News from Salem Lutheran Church

s Jesus was preparing his final journey toward the cross, he sat with his disciples to reinforce what the kingdom of heaven looks like. (Matthew 25:1-30) He then described the glory of his return and the examples of the fruit of his kingdom.

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' (Matthew 25:31-40)

Throughout this year, many in Christ's church will focus on the first of these fruits, feeding the hungry. The ELCA World Hunger organization is celebrating 50 years of feeding the hungry ones of the world this year. It seems a simple thing, but for many, basic needs are often unmet, and many suffer and die needlessly in a world that has such abundance. It has been said that there is not a food shortage on the earth, but an inequity in the distribution of the food that is available to be shared. How is this illustrated in the greater Peoria community? Where are the grocery stores abundant and what populations are overlooked from having adequate resources? What could be different? How does poverty affect the imbalance? What impact might Salem have as a partner with other ministry groups working to make a difference?

The theme for Lent this year at Salem will highlight the message of Jesus to his disciples as they sat on the hillside of the Mount of Olives overlooking the city of Jerusalem. Jesus knew he was going to face trials and suffer greatly in a few days, but he also knew his disciples would face additional challenges and persecutions as they carried forth the ministry of the kingdom for the sake of bearing

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fruit in his name long after he breathed his last. This Lent we will ponder what role we are being called to play out in Christ's church and the need to grow close together as we face the challenges to bear one another's burdens in offering hope and resources for the poor and marginalized ones of the earth.

Together we will wrestle with the issues of our time and strive to define ways to address what we see as the greatest needs before us. How would you answer the following questions? What have I done for Jesus today? Who are the ones in my life who long to be fed, quenched, welcomed, clothed, cared for, and visited in the name of Jesus? The journey for Lent begins February 14, but in reality, the journey began long ago among some bewildered followers called and sent to serve and witness the love of God through Jesus. The world's needs continue as does the call of Jesus to carry on the work. I pray that one day we are among the ones gathered at the right hand when Jesus comes again in his divine glory to say thank you for serving in my name.

Lent begins on February 14 with Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday

liturgy. Repentance is at the core of Christian living (the first of Luther's 95 Theses). During the season of Lent, with ashes on the forehead look toward the cross as a sign of God's reconciliation with all creation.

On Ash Wednesday, ashes in the form of the cross will be marked on your head. This is the same symbol placed on our bodies with water in baptism. Ashes also tell us the good news of the Gospel! Through the cross of Christ, the power of death has been destroyed. Through the cross there is life. The cross-shaped ashes on our foreheads proclaim the good news that sin and death have been conquered through the cross of Christ.

Come to the Lord's table - those marked with the cross of Christ are raised up, strengthened through God's mercy, love, and grace, and sent forth into the world to proclaim the good news! Ash Wednesday services will be offered with communion on Wednesday, February 14 at 11am and 6:30pm.



God's Wisdom and Promises by Jack Countryman (248.4 COU)



We are called to give food to those who hunger, give drink to those who thirst, welcome strangers, cloth the naked and provide company in times of illness and imprisonment. We are called to serve. Be part of that work and service during Lent and throughout the year!

You are invited on this 40-day journey through Lent to pray, discern, learn, and grow together to ponder what role we are being called to serve in Christ's church by exploring themes from Matthew 25:31-40.

• WEEK 1: FOOD FOR THE HUNGRY (What is a little among so many?)

Salem partners with the Bethel United Methodist Church food ministry by collecting non-perishable goods for their pantry. You can help feed others by bringing your donations during February. Suggested items for donation: canned vegetables, canned fruit, canned beans, canned meat, cereal, peanut butter, dry noodles, mac and cheese, stuffing, spaghetti, rice, instant potatoes, paper towels, and toilet paper. Mark your calendar to serve at Midwest Food Bank on March 20 at the Peoria Division at 9am.

• WEEK 2: DRINK FOR THE THIRSTY (I Thirst)

To clothe the naked means providing something to wear for someone who has none, or even very little. The Biblical sense of the term, however, also can mean bringing people out of darkness into the light. Phoenix Community Development Services strives to provide people with the opportunity to help themselves toward self-sufficiency. One way you can help clothe the naked is by donating new items for Phoenix Community Development Services' Homeless Outreach. These items include socks, hand warmers, warm hats, and gloves. During March you may bring these items to the collection box in the atrium.

• WEEK 5: CARE FOR THE SICK

Some people are "sick" not from physical illness, but from social isolation. One thinks especially of the Salem members and friends that whether at home or in long-term care facilities, live in isolation from their loved ones and friends. Ask how to become involved with Home Communion, help provide a ride to church, write a Thinking of You card, or pray for those on the prayer chain. Most of all, do not forget that some of them may even be members of your own family.

• MAUNDY THURSDAY, MARCH 28: VISIT THE IMPRISONED Worship service opportunities at 11am and 6:30pm.



FROM THE PARISH NURSE, LORI REIMER

In my position as Parish Nurse, I often help individuals with their medications. This often just includes understanding the medications or what questions to ask their healthcare team. Being a medical advocate for yourself or a loved one includes medication safety.

- When you begin a new med, ask questions of your health care team, which includes your pharmacists.
- · Look at the label every time and ask the pharmacist about anything on the label you do not understand.

· Check every prescription when you pick it up and question any possible discrepancy- change in size or color for example. They often use different manufacturers so the pill may look different.

· Be sure your healthcare team knows all of the non-prescription meds, vitamins, herbals and other dietary supplements that you are currently taking.

• Take your medications as directed by your healthcare team.

• Carry a current list of all medications (prescription and over-the-counter) with you at all times.

· Using a daily calendar or pillbox can help ensure that you take your meds every day; be sure to take your medications at the same time every day

· If you miss a dose of your medication, don't double up with the next dose. If unsure what to do, call your physician's office or pharmacist.

· Don't increase, decrease or stop taking medicine without notifying your healthcare team.

· Don't crush or split pills without check with your healthcare team.

· Don't share your prescription medications with anyone; don't take medication prescribed for someone else. Discard outdated medications.

• Store your medications as instructed by the pharmacist. Place them in a safe place away from heat, moisture or freezing temperatures.
