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Each year I apply gypsum to our lawn. It adds calcium and sulfur to the soil, breaks down compacted clay (a common soil type in our neighborhood) and thereby increases the absorption of water and nutrients to the root system and ultimately improves the color and density of the lawn. Tending a garden/lawn is more than working with what can be seen above the surface but also what is beneath what can be seen. For the past few years we noticed that our magnolia shrubs had scaly fungus growing on the bark and the edges of the leaves were curling and turning brown. Karen invested in a fungicide, sprayed the leaves and branches with neem oil but was unsuccessful and the conditioned worsened. At the end of the year in 2023, we decided to cut the branches to the ground and eventually we would dig out the roots and replace them. Much to our surprise last spring, green shoots sprouted from the lifeless looking stumps and eventually, leaves emerged and new growth took place. This spring there were blossoms that opened and even survived the late April freeze. From what we can tell, they are not dying at all but doing just fine.

We are entering the longest season of the church – Pentecost. It begins June 8, The Day of Pentecost, and ends November 23, Christ the King. The liturgical color between those dates is green as we focus on the growth of Christ's church. We often think of growth numerically: worship, Sunday school, VBS attendance, financial contributions, etc. – things we can measure. It is common to rank health and vitality of churches, organizations, communities, businesses based on these kinds of statistics and when numbers drop or plateau, we begin to wonder, are we growing or are we dying? Are there branches that need pruning? Do we need to tend to the roots of our faith, add spiritual nourishment to our souls so we can weather the droughts and storms of life?

At a recent Council meeting, we were processing monthly ministry reports and the reality that at least two of our standard ministries are not meeting. This does not mean there is no ministry taking place but that it is not as intentional as it has been and could be.

Whether we notice or not, scripture reminds us that in Christ we are a new creation. Everything old has died. Everything has become new. As we proceed into the season of Pentecost, the season of growth, I pray we eagerly anticipate the new life that we are promised in Jesus and live in it joyfully together.


ROAD TRIPPERS (PREK-5th GRADE)
